- All EIPS facilities (staff, employees, volunteers, contractors) to show proof of vaccine or negative PCR test every 3 days beginning Dec 1

- Those testing POS must isolate for 10 days or until symptoms resolve
- NEG Covid test not required after 10-day isolation period
- Close contacts need not quarantine

Planning for Post-secondary: Grade 12 Checklist SEPTEMBER

- Make sure the courses you are taking right now meet the admission requirements for the post-secondary program and school you would like to attend. Admission requirements are available online, or for more information on other post-secondary schools, ask your guidance counsellor or visit the post-secondary school's website.
- Apply for a Social Insurance Number (SIN) if you don't already have one.
- Create your own checklist of deadlines for:
 - Admissions applications (These will vary with each post-secondary school.)
 - Financial aid applications
 - Tuition
 - Housing
 - Materials you will need to submit.
- Tip: Keep all this information in a folder and record important dates in your calendar.
- For schools OUT OF PROVINCE Find out where and who to send your high school transcripts to.

TIP: Not sure where to start? Check out the post-secondary school's website or contact them directly.

• Start researching **scholarships and bursaries**. Bookmark anything that interests you online or print paper copies of post-secondary student funding programs and scholarships.

TIP: Get a head-start and begin to fill out applications now... send them in before the deadline to be safe.

• Update your **portfolio** to showcase all your accomplishments in school, volunteer work, jobs, hobbies, sports or other extra-curricular experiences.

You Should Know...

- Your Grade 11 final marks and first semester Grade 12 marks count heavily in post-secondary admissions.
- Some post-secondary schools have application deadlines as early as November 1. Check application deadlines for the post-secondary schools that interest you. Also, find out if there are early deadlines to qualify for certain programs, attend different campuses, or to apply for student housing.

Help Kids Navigate Viral Social Media Stunts

Learn why kids participate in viral social media challenges and how you can help them make responsible decisions. By <u>Christine Elgersma</u>

Fads are nothing new. We see a lot of people wearing, doing, or saying something, and we want to try it, too. Today, fads on social media can take the form of viral stunts captured on video. And since kids are sensitive to peer pressure and FOMO (fear of missing out), they're often the first to want to try them.

These stunts, also called "challenges," range from harmless to horrifying. They can be silly (the <u>Mannequin</u> <u>Challenge</u>), slightly risky (the <u>Make Your Own Slime Challenge</u>), destructive (the <u>Devious Licks Challenge</u>), or even

dangerous (the <u>Choking Challenge</u>). In most cases, kids just watch them for entertainment on platforms like <u>TikTok</u> or <u>YouTube</u>. But sometimes, kids are inspired to try them out and share their own videos of the results.

If you're looking for advice on talking to your kid about the latest social media challenge, check out these tips and conversation starters:

1. Talk about it.

Though we can't always be with our older kids and teens to prevent dangerous behavior, our words can stay with them.

Ask: "Have you ever thought about doing an online challenge?" Listen for hesitation, and let them know it's OK for them to check in with you first before participating.

2. Get them to think it through.

Help your kid think through the challenge and decide if it's safe or has potential risks. Stunts like the Devious Licks or <u>Slap a Teacher</u> challenges are not only wrong, but may have serious legal consequences when other people and property are harmed.

Ask: "What is this challenge asking you to do?" Encourage them to walk through each step and figure out where things could go wrong.

3. Acknowledge peer pressure.

Kids might feel pushed into participating in viral trends for different reasons. Maybe it was a dare, they want attention, or their friends are doing it.

Ask: "Why do you really want to do this? Is this a video of yourself that you really want out in the world?" Talk to them about how their <u>online videos can affect them in the future</u>.

4. Stay (somewhat) up to date.

Ask your kid about what's happening in their lives -- even when it seems like they don't want you to. Sometimes kids are more willing to talk about other kids than about themselves. Pose questions about friends, school, and trends.

Ask: "Would you consider doing a viral stunt if someone asked you? Which ones would you do and not do?" Keep an open mind and intervene if you're concerned about the latest craze.

5. Embrace the good ones.

Encourage your kid to find -- or maybe even start -- a positive online challenge. From feel-good dance crazes to global awareness campaigns, social media trends can spread happiness and motivate positive change.

Ask: "What kinds of challenges could do some good in the world or in our own community?" Help your kids brainstorm fun and safe options that everyone can take part in.

6. Model responsible online habits.

Some parents and caregivers are the ones recording their kids as they try these challenges. Make sure your involvement sends the message you intend.

Ask: "How can I help you with your idea?" Help your kids make the distinction between what is realistic and what may be dangerous so they can stay safe.

Planning for Post-secondary: Grade 12 Checklist OCTOBER

- Check your calendar... are any of your admission application deadlines coming up?
 TIP: Most of these application forms are completed through Apply Alberta. It is an online application system that will let students apply to one or more post-secondary institutions and authorize transcript transfers between participating institutions in the province.
- Continue to check and apply for **scholarships** from both public and private sources such as churches, community groups, the government or minority organizations.
- To get financial aid, you have to apply for it. Visit the Student Aid website to apply for financial aid, or talk with your high school guidance counsellor for more information.
 TIP: Some post-secondary schools have separate financial aid application forms called institutional aid applications. Do some research and find out if this is an available option for you!

You Should Know...

- If you have to move away from home, start researching possible places to live or contact the housing office at the post-secondary school you plan on attending for more information.
- Check to see if your school of choice is hosting an Open House-many do in the fall, so this is a great opportunity to visit the campus and learn more about your program options.

- Check your calendar... are your admission application deadlines coming up?
- Continue to search and apply for **scholarships** and other possible sources of financial aid.

You Should Know...

- There is a fee involved when requesting an official copy of your transcripts. Order an official copy of your transcripts after you graduate.
- If you plan on living in residence on campus, apply now. Many places offer accommodation on a first come, first serve basis.

- Check your calendar... are your admission application deadlines coming up? Many schools consider you for scholarships if you submit an application before Christmas.
- Continue exploring other possible sources of financial aid.

Bullying can often be confused with other behavior. Bullying is repeated mean, cruel, hurtful behaviours done on purpose by someone with more power. Bullying can come in many different forms including:

- **Physical bullying:** harassing someone by hitting, shoving, tripping or any other use of physical force.
- Emotional or psychological bullying: harassing someone with verbal attacks, hurtful comments, name-calling or teasing.
- **Cyberbullying:** harassing someone over social media, text, email, websites and other digital channels.
- Social bullying: harassing someone by excluding them, spreading rumours or giving them "the silent treatment."
- **Discriminatory bullying:** harassing someone based on sexual orientation, ethnicity, gender identity, religion or anything else perceived as making them "different."

Data from November 5, 2020 to May 3, 2021 Total of 14 COVID reported cases and once in outbreak status- students in person progressed-very little absenteeism for staff

High rate of High school completion 3, 4, 5 year completion rate

STAR results- Overall we saw student reading levels increase in grade 7, 9 and 11 however not a year's growth- due to the disruptions.

MIPI results- fairly static however teachers are reporting that greater concepts have been missed due to the disruptions and on-line learning.

STAR Results: Summary- Overall, we saw students reading levels increase in grade 7, 9 and 11 however not at a level of one y In grades 8, 10 and 12, there was a drop from pre to post testing. The results indicate COVID has resulted in learning loss for so and unfinished learning (not a year's growth) for others.



MIPI Results have remained fairly static however teachers are reporting that greater concepts have been missed as a result of C disruptions to learning. Fall MIPI results indicate that in 2019, 60% of students met the benchmark, 58% in 2020, 55% in 2021.
